John Rutter: O be joyful in the Lord

English composer Sir William Walton (1902-1983) began his musical life as a chorister at Christ Church, Oxford. Palestrina's motet is a setting of Psalm 137:1-2. John Rutter's setting of the Jubilate Deo (O be joyful in the Lord) can be found on a recording which John and the Cambridge Singers released in 2004.

William Billings (1746-1800) was an early American composer of hymns. Jacobus Gallus, also known as Jakob Handl (1550-1591), was born in Slovenia. He was heavily influenced by the Venetian style of the Gabrielis, Claudio Merulo and others. French teacher and composer Nadia Boulanger (1887-197) taught and helped shaped the musical careers of many musicians including Quincy Jones, Igor Markevitch, and many more.

American composer Julian Wachner (1969-) is Organist and Director of the Arts for Trinity Church, Wall Street, New York. rench composer Marcel Dupré's short Toccata comes from his Tombeau de Titleouze.

J.S. Bach: Cantata 21, "Ich hatte viel Bekummernis"

Choir of St. Thomas Church, Leipzig; New Bach Collegium Musicum, Hans-Joachim Rotz Arleen Auger, soprano; Peter Schreier, tenor; Siegfried Lorenz, bass

The German translates as "My heart was deeply troubled". This rather lengthy cantata was first performed in Weimar in 1713. Most commentators admire the complex, fugal musical writing and consider this one of Bach's finest cantatas.

Felix Mendelssohn: Hora est

Felix Mendelssohn composed this anthem in 1828 at age 19.

Daniel E. Gawthrop: Exultate

Besides being an accomplished composer, Daniel E. Gawthrop is an organist, as you will begin to realize during the playing of his "Exultate."

Philippe de Monte: Missa "La dolce vista"

Philippe de Monte (1521–1603) was one of the most prolific composers of his era. He composed over one thousand madrigals and two hundred-fifty motets.

W.A. Mozart: Litaniae de venerabili altaris Sacramento, K. 243 Gloriae Dei Cantores; Vox Caeli Sinfonia, Richard K. Pugsley

Ryan Turner writes: "The Litaniae de venerabili altaris Sacramento is the last and most mature of his four Litany settings. Composed in 1776 - before the Masses, the Requiem, and the Vesper settings, it was first performed on Palm Sunday in Salzburg. The Sacramental Litany is a prayer of supplication, with a steady repetition of acclamations, and a testimony of praise and veneration of the Eucharist."

George Frideric Handel: Chandos Anthem No. 10, "The Lord is my light" Choir of King's College, Cambridge; Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Sir David Willcocks

April Cantelo, soprano; Ian Partridge, tenor; Andrew Davis, organ continuo

Handel wrote the eleven Chandos anthems whilst in the employ of James, Duke of Chandos from 1717-1719. Some musicologists have opined that these anthems were in fact sketches for much larger works HAndel would compose later on.

Joao Lourenco Rebelo: Magnificat a 13 The Sixteen; His Majesties Sagbutts and Cornetts, Harry Christophers Portugese Renaissance composer Joao Lourenco Rebelo (1610-1661) was the last composer of his era.
