In the years since, I have undertaken many music related roles: rock and classical performer, music producer, recording engineer, and teacher.

I am fortunate enough to be part of a fantastic team of musicians and scholars who each have decades of experience in classical music. In turn, our team is supported by volunteers who help with a wide-range of important music department tasks, and often assisted by fellow employees from other departments at the station. Every day of programming from The Classical Station is a product of our community, and is carefully curated for our listeners both local and international.

The classical music repertoire consists of a body of work which has stood the test of time. Yet there is room for more works to join that great tradition. With the assistance



July 1-4

Independence Day:

America's favorite weekend begins July 1st with a day of requests from our listeners the world over during All Request Friday. Enjoy a Saturday of favorites during Weekend Classics on July 2nd, and another opportunity to hear your favorite pieces on our Saturday Evening Request Program. On Sunday morning, July 3rd, relax with Great Sacred Music followed by an

afternoon of featured music from American composers. Finally, join The Classical Station in celebrating America's birthday with a Monday of friends, fireworks, and traditional Independence Day tunes.

July 14

Bastille Day:

Celebrate all that is French in classical music with a special program of works inspired by French artists or written by French composers. Gossec, Liszt, Farrenc, and Debussy all feature on this day of *musique*, capped off by a performance of the opera *Romeo and Juliet* (Gounod) with commentary from Dr. Jay Pierson.

August 8-9

Cinema Classics:

Classical music reaches its widest audience as a feature of film and television, which make those two venues a vital part of the classical tradition. Follow the state of the art during Cinema Classics Weekend, as we feature the Wagnerian inspired leitmotifs of John Williams, the organic atmospherics of Thomas Newman, and the pulsing minimalism of Hans Zimmer. August 26


Women's Equality Day:

The 19th Amendment, which belatedly gave women the right to vote, was signed into law on this date in 1920. Marking this occasion will be a morning featuring works by important composers in classical music who were women.

Amy Beach, born in New Hampshire in 1867, was an accomplished pianist who made her debut with the Boston Symphony Orchestra performing a concerto by Chopin. She is the first American female composer to write a symphony and wrote many pieces for piano, including *Variations on Balkan Themes*, op. 60 and *From Blackbird Hills*, op. 8, as well as her own piano concerto. Always

an advocate for other female musicians, she founded the Society of American Women Composers in 1925.

Later in the day, show your own support for the equality of women in the arts by requesting your favorite female composers.

In August, Renaissance Fare highlights the most famous French composer of the period, Josquin des Prez, who died in August 1521. He was so popular that he was generally referred to only as "Josquin," - a 15th century Elvis! He wrote motets, sacred music chansons, and ballads. The program airs on Monday, August 8 at 7:00 pm with a repeat broadcast on Sunday, August 14 at 5:00 pm.

June 2 Handel's Rodelinda

Rodelinda is stricken with grief, believing that her husband, Bertirino, is dead, but is he? Several suitors try to steal her heart, yet she remains faithful to her husband's memory. All is well that ends well and her husband returns, making a joyous ending to this masterpiece.

June 9 Mozart's Cosi fan tutte

Comic opera at its best! Two gentlemen are in love with women who are sisters, and they devise a plot to test their fidelity. The men go off to a fictitious war and return disguised as Balkan soldiers. They try to seduce each other's lover. Do the sisters give in? Tune in and find out.

June 16 Bizet's Les Pêcheurs de Perles

Georges Bizet burst onto the colorful Parisian operatic scene with *Les Pêcheurs de Perles* in 1863, just a few months shy of his 25th birthday. June 23

Viva Verdi!

Great moments, scenes, and acts from the 19th century Italian operatic master, Giuseppe Verdi. Music from *Rigoletto*, *La Traviata*, *Otello*, *Don Carlos* and more.

June 30

Moore and Latouche's The Ballad of Baby Doe

A truly American opera, based on a true story and set in Leadville, Colorado. The young Elizabeth (Baby) Doe has left her husband and moves to Leadville. She meets and falls in love with Horace Tabor, a politician and investor in silver. However, Horace

Tabor is married to Augusta Tabor. It is quite the scandal for the day.

July 7

Puccini's *Il Trittico* Suor Angelica

Angelica belongs to an aristocratic Florentine family and is forced to don a nun's habit after she gave birth to an illegitimate child. There is no respite for Angelica at the convent, only tragedy.

Puccini's Il Tabarro

At sunset on the Seine sits an old cargo barge owned by an equally old Michele. Michele has married the much younger Giorgetta. However, Giorgetta is passionate for another.

Puccini's Gianni Schicchi

In this comic opera, wealthy Buosu Donati has died leaving his assets to the monks, not his family. Outraged, greedy and wanting to be rich, his heirs engage in a ruse with the wily Gianni Schicchi. Amid the mayhem, Lauretta sings the beloved aria, "O mio babbino caro", pleading with her father to marry her true love. Rinuccio.

July 14 Gounod's Romeo and Juliet

Juliet wants to enjoy her life to the fullest before she gets married, however, her father has other ideas and has promised her to Count Paris. When Romeo enters the scene, all bets are off. It is love at first sight, even though they are from two different feuding families.

July 21 Ponchielli's La Gioconda

When La Gioconda, a street singer, crosses paths with Barnaba, an evil-hearted spy, a tangled web ensues. This opera has everything: deception, deceit, intrigue, suicide, murder, disguises, trickery, evil characters and more than a few poison elixirs. (An archival broadcast hosted by the late Al Ruocchio)

July 28 Verdi's Falstaff

Falstaff was Verdi's second comic opera and his third work based on a Shakespeare play, following *Macbeth* and *Otello*. The plot revolves around the thwarted, sometimes farcical, efforts of the obese knight Sir John Falstaff while he tries to seduce two married women. Why? So that he may gain access to their families wealth!



Leif Ove Andsnes

WCPE's new music director Caleb Gardner interviews pianist Leif Ove Andsnes about his new recording with the Mahler Chamber Orchestra, *Mozart Momentum* – 1786. The original audio interview has been abridged and edited for this edition of Quarter Notes.

Caleb Gardner: What is the difference between preparing for a concert and preparing for a recording?

Leif Ove Andsnes: When I am planning to make a new recording, I normally want to play that repertoire quite a lot in concert. I learn things about the piece and the way that the piece communicates with the audience, which is difficult to learn in your practice room, even if you try to think about everything. When I get to the studio, you might say that is the end of the journey. Having said that, when I do start recording, I will make a take and I will go and listen to it and think, "Oh, I need to change this and that. There needs to be more contrast

in color or in dynamics or in tempo." The studio situation is a very creative process to get to the result I want.

Caleb Gardner: Once you've recorded your performance, do you like to be involved in the final product or do you leave that mostly in the hands of the engineers and producers?

Leif Ove Andsnes: I'm very involved in the post-production, actually. The editor, producer, and I work closely together. One thing which I discovered, and which we found was a way to work during the pandemic, was to edit over the internet. Using an online application, we listen to the recording at the same time, talk about





it, and we decide how to edit it together. I've spent a lot of time editing at home in London with the team online. And that's a real job! I think it's really important that artists are involved in that process because ultimately it's so personal and only I l know exactly how I want a certain phrase to go. And if I have a choice of seven different takes, I should be the one to ultimately make that choice. Which one? The one that feels right.

Caleb Gardner: What are the connections between Mozart's operas and the piano concertos on this album?

Leif Ove Andsnes: By 1786, Mozart had already started writing The Marriage of Figaro, his groundbreaking new opera. And that opera had so many new virtuosic things. You have ensembles of many singers at the same time on stage singing individual lines, and that kind of freedom spills over to the instrumental writing. So when we look at these concertos, I recorded number 23 and 24, especially the wind writing and the wind ensembles are very operatic. He gives the wind soloists tremendous individuality and personality, and one could imagine them being different characters on a stage. There's complexity to the orchestra writing in these concertos which are richer than before. I find myself in these concertos very rarely playing alone without the orchestra around me in some way. Here there is a tapestry of colors and voices going on.

Caleb Gardner: What makes the Mahler Chamber Orchestra such a good fit with you and your playing?

Leif Ove Andsnes: It's an extremely flexible and confident orchestra when it comes to this music. They can change sounds and characters like nobody else so quickly, like a chameleon. It can be an explosive chord and then a very tender phrase. They surprise me. They always come with colors and ideas that I hadn't thought about, even if I have ideas in my head that I want to get across. I also get delighted by what they have to offer. And there is an attitude in the orchestra which is very special. There is a feeling that everybody has one direction to a common goal to find a truth in the music. There can be different truths in music, but they want to make every project something very special. I just love, adore working with them as well.

Caleb Gardner: The liner notes mention that at this period in Mozart's life, he was divided between satisfying the needs of the public and his own artistic journey. Do those feelings reflect how you feel at times, given the state of classical music, how it's ever changing and can be difficult? Do you feel that way?

Leif Ove Andsnes: Yeah, I think we all always have to. The only way we can be convincing is to believe 100% in the music and in a performance that we want to deliver. As a performer, I can only be different in an authentic way and be myself if I am trying to give justice to the score and what I feel about the music. And then when a performance is convincing like that, then I feel that the audience comes to you. They are attracted by what's happening on stage and they are really starting to listen. And then you feel it in the concentration of the audience, you feel it in the silence and the intensity of the moment.

Who Is Florence Price? Young Musicians Tell the Story of A Girl and Her Music

By Schirmer Trade Books, 2021 A review by Greysolynne Hyman

Whether you do or don't know who Florence Price is, you will appreciate this unique book when you read it. The authors (and illustrators) of this charming, informative, and inspirational book are middle-school students at the Special Music School, a collaboration between the Kaufman Music Center and New York City's Department of Education. Their enthusiasm for their subject shines through the pages of this book: they clearly admire all of Ms. Price's efforts to have her first symphony performed despite prejudice against her gender and race. She finally succeeded in 1933, with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra performing her Symphony no. 1 at the World's Fair, providing students with an example of talent and determination conquering adversity. There is an emphasis on the value of hard work throughout the book.

The text is easily accessible to children but is also at a level that adults can enjoy reading. Her story is told as an answer to the question, "Who is Florence Price?" This question arises when a couple buys a house outside of Chicago in 2009, and finds boxes of yellowed sheet music by Ms. Price.

In addition to the children's narrative, there is a biography of Ms. Price. The biography includes photographs but, frustratingly, there is one group picture that does not indicate



which of the 16 people in it is the composer. There is also a list of selected works, and questions to stimulate discussion are included. A particularly appealing feature is the yellowed first page of her Violin Concerto no. 2 on the inside cover and last page of the book.

The revival of the beautiful music of Florence Price has been a gift to classical music and to the world. This book is also a gift in a larger sense, providing optimism about the youth of today and the future of classical music. It would make an ideal gift for a child in your life and belongs in the collection of every public school and music library.
