### Something New For Summer: September 1st Seiji Ozawa

10 a.m.: Beethoven's "Ode to Joy" from Symphony no. 9

During the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano, Japan, Ozawa conducted performers in the stadium and around the world in the first ever international audiovisual simulcast. The Ode to Joy is the final movement of Beethoven's 9th Symphony.

Four vocal soloists, chorus and orchestra join forces in a moment of musical jubilance.

### September 8th Antonin Dvořák

9 a.m.: Symphony in E minor, Op. 95 From the New World

Dvořák masterfully combines folk tunes with sophisticated harmonic material in this justifiably famous work. Commonly performed and enjoyed for its energetic contours, careful listening reveals as much drama in the slow swells of the 2nd movement as in the staccato beats of the finale. The outsize influence of the 9th reveals itself in unexpected places: the fast rising strings

of the 1st movement might feel familiar to fans of *Star Wars* by John Williams, and the ominous semi-tone motive that opens the 4th unmistakably reminds us of the frightening theme to *Jaws*.

### September 18th Simone Dinnerstein

4 p.m.: Ravel Piano Concerto

The world turned to a sublime piece of music composed by Mozart to begin the healing process after the terror attacks of 9/11, 2001. On this 21st-anniversary of that fateful morning, we again seek comfort in Mozart's Requiem, a work he composed in the last days of his life.

### September 25th Dmitri Shostakovich

5 p.m.: Symphony no. 5 in D Minor

This piece received a politically motivated standing ovation that lasted more than

half an hour at its premiere in 1937, but is now appreciated in earnest by audiences world-wide. Although Shostakovich's music is sometimes considered difficult to understand, this work is widely considered among his most accessible. The final movement is a demonstration of politics as ironic art. The string section obediently loses its individual identity in service to the unrelenting, workman-like theme.

### October 2nd

10 a.m.: Sergei Rachmaninoff: Vespers

From the pen of a composer highly regarded for his piano concerti and symphonies comes a setting of the Russian Orthodox liturgy. The work had its premiere on March 23, 1915. Listen for the warm, purring low

notes produced by the bassos known as oktavists.

#### October 7th Yo-Yo Ma

9 a.m.: J.S. Bach: Cello Suite in G major, BWV 1007

Perhaps the world's most famous classical musician, Ma is celebrated for his versatility, performing classical and modern repertoire pieces on stage, in the recording studio, and for film. This vintage recording presents Ma at his most precise and traditional; beautifully rendering Bach's universally beloved Cello Suite in G.

### October 16th Marin Alsop

12 a.m.: Brahms: Symphony no. 2 in D major

Alsop's brilliant career has included leading world class orchestras including the Symphonies in Baltimore, Bournemouth, and San Paulo, and dozens of award-winning recordings as a guest conductor. She leads the legendary London Philharmonic in this recording of Brahm's second symphony, which merges a triumphant score with her sublime style.

### October 18th Miguel Llobet

9 a.m.: Variations on a theme by Sor

Llobet manipulates the original theme harmonically, rhythmically, and structurally, along the way producing some of the most stylish and idiomatic guitar music ever written. The third variation enhances the motive with beautiful harmonic material while the ninth requires the player to perform the nearly impossible: play the guitar with one hand.

### November 14th Aaron Copland

5 p.m.: "Sunday Traffic" from Music for Movies

American composer Aaron Copland is responsible for some of the best-loved works in the classical canon. His "Sunday Traffic" from Music for Movies demonstrates the reasons for his wide appeal in less than three minutes. Urgent rhythms, accessible melodies, and a sense of harmony at once formal and familiar.

### November 15th Daniel Barenboim

9 a.m.: Beethoven: 2nd movement from Piano Sonata no. 8

5 p.m.: Wagner: "Ride of the Valkyries" from Die Walkure

Barenboim has achieved extraordinary success as both pianist and conductor. His performance of the delicate second movement from Beethoven's 8th sonata showcases his sensitivity as a player, while his leadership of the Paris Orchestra in the "Ride of the Valkyries" shows the great passion and precision his leadership demands.

### November 21st Francisco Tarrega

9 a.m.: "Recuerdos de la Alhambra"

Tarrega's classical guitar standard utilizes the "tremolo" technique, which creates the illusion of two guitarists playing at once. Parkening performs the piece with such fluidity that the focus of the listener remains on the work-a gorgeous blend of longing and hope-and not merely on the technique.

#### November 27th

10 a.m.: Carols and Hymns for Advent

We observe the beginning of the Church Year or the First Sunday in Advent with choral music from England. The Choir of Saint Paul's Cathedral presents a varied program beginning with the austerity of Palestrina's Mattins Responsory "I look from afar" ending with the late John Scott playing Andrew Carter's brilliant "Toccata on Veni Emmanuel."

### September 11th

### Patriot Day

We will commemorate this day and remember those we lost with a selection of contemplative works, a moment of silence, and a special performance of Mozart's *Requiem in D minor*. (see highlights notes)

### September 20th

### Lesser Known

Bach and Beethoven. Mozart and Mendelssohn. Schumann and Schubert. These are among the eternal composers whose works are heard regularly on stages and recordings around the world. Yet there exists a multitude of beautiful works written by less familiar musicians. Hear pieces from Karl Friedrich Abel, Anton Arensky, Sergei Lyapunov, and others as we focus our attention on less known – but no less talented – composers.

### September 22nd The Great Outdoors

Art and the outdoors have always been inextricably linked. During the Romantic Era, writers, painters, and musicians found that spending time in nature contributed to their creative process, and that some of



their experiences in wild settings can provide inspiration to their work. Find your own inspiration on the first day of Fall.

### September 24th-25th Great Ballet Days

Great Ballet Days highlight the special relationship between classical music and dance with a weekend featuring the music of the great ballets. Selections from Tchaikovsky, Verdi, and Prokofiev are among the many 'moving' works to be heard, enjoyed, and even danced to during this celebration.

### October 6th In the Beginning

Overtures and Preludes are the musical equivalent to the phrase "Once upon a Time." Sometimes they serve to set the stage. Other times they suggest a general theme. Occasionally, a piece of music serves to tell the story, no matter how tragic and complex, all on its own.

## October 8th-9th Film Today

Classical music is alive and well at the movies. The ultimate programmatic music, film composers use any means necessary to achieve that most sacred goal of art-eliciting and enhancing emotion. Our special film weekend will include classic film scores all weekend and conclude with a special Film Music edition of *Preview!*



In order to find true love, Prince Karl Franz (Rendall) enters Heidelberg University incognito. Is he successful in keeping his identity secret?

### September 15 Saint-Saëns' Samson et Dalila

Based on the biblical story of Sampson and Delilah, this work is Camille Saint-Saëns' crowning achievement. (An archival broadcast by the late Al Ruocchio.)

### September 22

Rodgers and Hammerstein's The Sound of Music

Set in Austria on the eve of the Anschluss in 1938, the musical tells the story of Maria who takes a job as governess to a large family with the intention of becoming a nun...or not. She falls in love with the children and eventually their father, Captain Von Trapp.

#### September 29 Chausson's Le Roi Arthus

An amazing retelling of the Arthurian legend complete with Lancelot (Winbergh), Guinevere (Żylis-Gara), and Merlin the wizard (Cachemaille).

### October 6

Gilbert and Sullivan's The Pirates of Penzance

Frederick (Lewis) is released from a band of tender-hearted pirates by contract. He meets the Major-General Stanley's daughter, Mabel (Morison). Will Frederick's leap-year birthday confuse his release date (and his plans with Mabel), or will the Major-General (Baker) have a change of heart?

### October 13

Rossini's Ermoine

A musical mystery... This premiered in 1819, closed after only seven performances, and was not heard again for a century. Rossini loved the opera, calling it his "Little William Tell."

### Verdi's Un Ballo In Maschera (The Masked Ball)

October 20

Riccardo (Bergonzi), the governor of Boston,

is throwing a masked ball. Riccardo is in love with Amelia (Nilsson), but Amelia is married to Riccardo's friend, Renato (MacNeil). (Archival broadcast by the late Al Ruocchio)

### November 3

Bizet's Carmen

When the lives of Carmen (Norman) and Don José (Schicoff) collide, their stories culminate in jealousy, deceit, and murder. (Archival broadcast by the late Al Ruocchio)

### November 10 Wagner's The Flying Dutchman

Every seven years, the Flying Dutchman (Adam), condemned to roam the sea for defiling God, is cast ashore to seek redemption. Only the love of a woman willing to sacrifice her life for him can release him from his curse.

#### November 17 Massenet's Cherubin

Cherubin is an entertaining comic opera, first performed in 1905 with Mary Garden in the lead (trouser) role. The story takes place where *The Marriage of Figaro* leaves off!

#### Copland's *The Tender Land* November 24

American opera is alive and well! Set in the Rural Midwest during the Great Depression, The Tender Land is a beautiful, simple story about a young woman's coming of age.






## Preview!

### Sundays at 6:00 p.m. (eastern) With host David Jeffrey Smith By Rob Kennedy

This quarter, our guests will include a diverse cast of personalities active in the classical music world. Award winning Scottish guitarist Sean Shibe will discuss his new album, Camino, which features French and Iberian music. He is the recipient of the Royal Philharmonic Society Award for Young Artists. Zalman Raffael, Artistic Director of Carolina Ballet since 2019, has choreographed over 30 ballets. In 2018, he helped start the School of Carolina Ballet. Composer Samuel Adler emigrated to the United States from Germany in 1939. He has composed over 400 pieces including six symphonies and five operas.



## Jose Serebrier: Portraits of the Maestro



Reading this enjoyable book provides detailed information on the musical life and career of Jose Sererbrier and, most importantly, a deep understanding of the tremendous talent of this man. Much of the book consists of interviews and these give the book a very personal feeling. Many of these interviews were conducted by the author of this book, Michel Faure, who is a French music and movie critic.

Born in Montevideo, Uruguay, Señor Serebrier did not become interested in music until the age of nine. He began by taking violin lessons and quickly started composing, first for the violin and then for the symphony. At the age of eleven, he decided he wanted to become a conductor. He went to the Minister of Culture's Office and convinced the head of the music department that there should be a youth orchestra. Serebrier assembled the orchestra in a week! Of course, he was the conductor. This is the first example of Maestro Serebrier's outstanding ability to enlist the help of others to develop his musical career. He has received many awards, fellowships, and grants. They are listed and explained in one chapter of the book. This chapter does not appear so much as bragging as an expression of gratitude for assistance.

Mr. Serebrier has worked with some of the most respected contemporary conductors — Pierre Monteux, Antal Dorati, Leopold Stowkowski, and George Szell, to name a few. They are included in his chapter on experiences and anecdotes about colleagues and mentors. This chapter provides fascinating insights on the personal and professional conduct of these people.



A prolific composer, Maestro Serebrier's published works are cited in an appendix. Having begun composing at age nine, his latest pieces at age 82 date to 2020. They run the gamut from scores for solo instruments, ensembles, and symphonies to many other musical forms.

There are several pages of interesting photographs. One is of Serebrier's debut conducting at age 11 as he faces the president of Uruguay and his cabinet. Others are of him with Leopold Stowkowski, Samuel Barber, and Ira Gershwin's sister.

The world is fortunate that Jose Serebrier has devoted his life to classical music and that in this book he takes us along on the adventure in such an engaging fashion.
